POETRY AT ARTWALK!

A traveling poetry trail is making its debut at this year's ArtWalk thanks to the United Arts Council in partnership with Raleigh Fine Arts Society. The poetry trail is a creative placemaking initiative by United Arts to amplify the voices of the students who entered the Triangle-wide Spoken Word Competition for high school students. This initiative was created by the 2023 Piedmont Laureate, Dasan Ahanu. The 12 students will be featured on QR codes that can be scanned to watch their video performances of their original poetry. ACORN AVENGERS NOTES

The air is cooling and leaves are falling. While raking those leaves to the street is certainly an option; using them to enrich the soil, to mulch your garden beds, and to support a diverse and thriving ecosystem is another way to go.

Use Leaves to Fertilize your Lawn

While a heavy mat of whole leaves can damage a lawn over the winter, shredded leaves serve as fertilizer to enrich the lawn. Use a mulching lawn mower, add a mulching blade to your mower, or just use a regular mower to shred dry leaves. You'll need to push your mower over a pile of dry leaves several times to shred them into smaller bits. You can also use a leaf shredder. Top dress the lawn with the bounty. A half inch or so of shredded leaves make a great fertilizer.

Use Leaves as a Mulch for Garden Beds

Leaves make great mulch for garden beds. If you use shredded leaves they break down much faster and enrich the soil. But whole leaves will break down over time as well. Let earthworms dig in all the nutrients. This organic matter enriches the soil and lightens up heavy clay soil making spring planting much easier. Mulch also helps conserve water and suppress weeds.

Compost those Leaves

Composting is an ideal way of getting rid of vegetable, garden, and organic waste. Leaves are particularly coveted. Good compost is made up of about 3 parts "browns" (dry leaves, pine needles, straw,

paper, etc.) and 1 part greens (vegetable scraps, grass clippings, coffee grounds, etc.) plus a bit of water and mixing. While house-holds may have an endless supply of greens, browns can become scarce by the time spring comes along. I like to keep a barrel of shredded leaves to use throughout the year. Ripened compost is known as black gold. It does amazing things for the garden!

Boylan Heights, in partnership with the West Morgan Neighborhood Association and the Friends of the Boylan Bridge, Inc., a non-profit established by residents of West Morgan and Boylan Heights, is working on a public art project. Old Business: Meeting at Dix about what buildings to tear down. At the last meeting, there was talk of a special tax for properties on the edge–Lake Wheeler area and Centennial Campus. One proposal would include taxing parts of Boylan Heights. They don't seem to want to do that.

ArtWalk: Update by Susan Thompson; applicants have been notified of acceptances, declines, and waitlists. 230 applied. All are invited to join the next meeting. Volunteers are needed to help with the food, too. Lynn Senior will organize them.

The request to be considered now is a property that abuts that property (at Dorothea and S. Saunders) which, on the other side, abuts single-family housing.
