HISTORY HEIGHTS


Did you know that Boylan Heights was planned to be a little larger than its current boundaries? W Lenoir St currently ends at McCulloch St. But originally it was planned to extend to Mountford Ave which was a block longer than its current length. What happened? The railroad along the Western edge of the neighborhood didn't exist when Boylan Heights was designed. The Railroad was approved shortly after the design and the company bought up the lots in the Lenoir Mountford area and caused the reconfiguring of a number of lots along McCulloch and W Cabarrus.

SAVE THE DATE! TREE PLANTING

Plans are in the works for a tree planting event on Tuesday, November 22nd in the afternoon. We have partnered with the City for the planting of 24 new trees along Dorothea Drive to enhance the buffer between our neighborhood and Western Blvd. The City is kindly providing 7-gallon trees (a mixture of hollies, magnolias, and cedars) as well as a planting demo, mulch and other necessary supplies. Boylan Heights is responsible for providing the volunteers! Stay tuned for more information, including how to sign up in the coming weeks.

Potters, jewelers, painters, photographers, metalsmiths, woodworkers, glass makers and others with unique talents will be setting up on our porches, lawns and in studios to bring an incredible array of outstanding work to help celebrate this joyous season. We especially look forward to many of our neighborhood artists who will be sharing their creativity as well.

We are continuing to space out the artists based on the positive feedback we received last year and to provide better social distancing. For the most part we are again only placing one artist on each porch as well as making sure to keep lawn placements well-spaced. Thanks to the generosity of Jim and Leslie Kellenberger, we will continue to offer food options with a menu of delicious offerings.

As always, thanks to our gracious hosts who do so much to make visiting artists feel welcome and additional thanks to the entire neighborhood which helps set a jolly, holiday spirit throughout Boylan Heights.

As a reminder, ArtWalk is a juried show, which means that artists apply and then are reviewed by a review panel (the jury) made up of artists and neighbors to insure that ArtWalk maintains a high standard of outstanding artists. After this review process artists are invited to participate. Please do not invite artists that have not gone through the review process (or who have and may not have been selected for this year) to set up in the neighborhood. Having a professional process keeps ArtWalk's reputation high in the arts community.

In advance of ArtWalk I ask that neighbors please try to park in your driveways or alleys prior to December 4th to provide as much parking as possible for our visitors. Regarding leaf pick up, please try to keep leaves out of parking spaces on the street and keep space as tidy as possible. Any other extra sprucing up/holiday decorating helps contribute to the holiday spirit. As you see visitors, be sure to greet them and offer any directions or assistance. Boylan Heights is known for its hospitality so let's keep up the tradition!

Let me also thank the hard work of the ArtWalk committee that has helped in many ways, even as we haven't been able to meet in person. In addition to the committee, we need volunteers to help at ArtWalk. If you are interested in volunteering, please let me know. We need folks to help staff information tents, serve as booth sitters and assist with getting signage and other information out. It's a great way to meet neighbors as well as some wonderful artists. I promise not to work you too hard and to leave you plenty of time for shopping. Also, volunteers are also needed to help the Kellenbergers staff the food stand.

Welcome & Meet Your Neighbors

Approval of Agenda & Previous Month's Minutes: The meeting agenda was approved unanimously. The previous month's minutes were unanimously approved.

Police Report: Officer DiCello could not attend; Mike Motsinger gave a brief update on his behalf. Raleigh PD apprehended and charged someone with a series of larcenies in or around the neighborhood. There was also an incident in the neighborhood involving the State Highway Patrol and a motorcycle chase.

Meet the Candidates: Todd Kennedy attended the meeting and introduced himself as a native of the region and a resident Raleigh since the mid-1990's. He's had a 25-year career in public infrastructure and environmental protection and served on City boards and commissions over the years. His campaign is endorsed by former mayors McFarlane and Meeker. When asked to name his top issues, he cited housing access and affordability and investing in Raleigh's public safety. He took questions from the neighborhood about citizen engagement, housing affordability, and density.

Financial Report: John Bush presented the monthly report. Overall, the financial position has remained stable. Over the past month we have paid annual insurance policies. John noted this year has been unusual in that we have not had any neighborhood fundraisers or income activities apart from ArtWalk and therefore we have spent more money this year than we have received. Also, John formally resigned as Treasurer effective immediately.

Election of Treasurer: John Bush nominated Margaret McEndarfer. Motion approved unanimously. Congratulations, Margaret!

Committee Updates: BRT - Plans are in the works for a volunteer tree planting effort on the afternoon of November 22. The City has agreed to provide 24 evergreen trees in the buffer area between Dorothea Drive and Western Blvd with the help of neighborhood volunteers. This is part of our effort to proactively enhance this buffer in advance of BRT implementation. It also serves as a beautification project! More news will be shared including the official

volunteer sign-up and waiver required by the City. **ArtWalk 30th Anniversary** - John Bush report a robust number of applications received from artists thus far. We will need volunteers for this annual event! Please reach out to Lyman Collins boylanheightsartwalk@gmail.com.
